From our Pastor

With the warming weather I've been thinking about cicadas and other summer bugs. More specifically, I've been pondering metamorphosis and how it might relate to spiritual growth. Scientifically, there are two different types of metamorphosis: complete and incomplete.

Complete metamorphosis consists of four stages: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. This is the typical caterpillar → chrysalis → butterfly metamorphosis, but it includes all kinds of insects including mosquitos, ladybugs, beetles, and flies. What is always so striking about complete metamorphosis is the changes between the different stages. When the larva enters its pupa stage its cells completely liquify and are reconstituted into the new adult form. If you didn't know better, would you ever assume a caterpillar, a chrysalis, and a butterfly are all the same organism? You may have seen a larval ladybug and never recognized it as such.

Incomplete metamorphosis consists of three stages: egg, nymph, and adult. For some insects the nymphs and adults are extremely alike. The nymphs will visually look very similar, but they are smaller, and lack things like wings and genitalia. As they grow the insect will shed its exoskeleton and expand itself until it is finally an adult. In other insects, such as cicadas and dragonflies, the nymphs look extremely different from their adult forms, but they don't go through a pupa stage. However, when you look closely at a nymph dragonfly or cicada you are able to see what will become its wings, the mouth pieces look similar, the number of legs are the same. They are not as dissimilar as at first glance.

I think these two describe what happens in terms of spiritual growth for most Christians too. Please note, I'm not suggesting one of the following is better than any of the others.

There are the complete metamorphosis folks whose faith looks completely different than it did before. The revival preachers with the big "turned my life around" messages fall in this category. Also in this category are the ex-evangelicals and deconstructionists. Sometimes the faith of our adult lives is completely different from what we grew up with. These folks usually have some type of pupa stages where much of their faith is liquified and reconstituted.

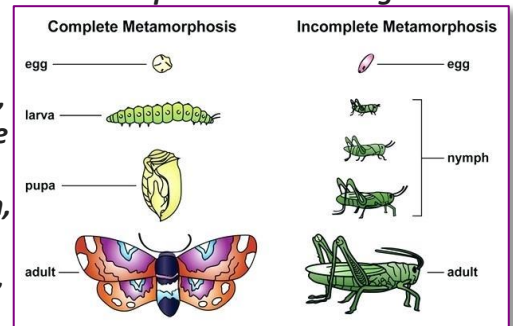
Then there are the incomplete metamorphosis folks. Their faith as adults looks like what they grew up with. There have certainly been times when their faith has broken out of an old exoskeleton, and they have stretched and grown, but all in all their faith is recognizable. Other times the changes look dramatic, but upon closer inspection, you can see the seeds of their younger faith in their adult faith. (I would put myself in this category.)

We didn't talk about frogs and how they absorb their tails and gills to grow arms and lungs... Sometimes, we have to cannibalize unnecessary parts of our faith to allow more useful parts to grow.

As Christians we continue to learn and grow. This is going to lead us to changes in our faith. Change can be scary, and the outcome might be unrecognizable to our former selves. But we must always strive to metamorphose closer to the heart of God.

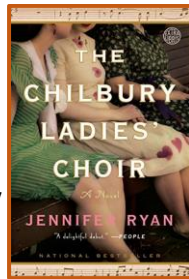
