From Our Pastor

As the calendar turns and a new year begins, many of us feel the familiar pull toward New Year's resolutions. We resolve to exercise more, eat better, manage our time wisely, or finally tackle that long-delayed project. While these intentions often begin with hope, they can quickly become another list of expectations we struggle to meet, another measure by which we feel we fall short.

I had a Facebook memory last week from 6 years ago in which I shared a screenshot of my phone's screen time which averaged around 6 hours a day for the week. I lamented at the time how terrible that was and how I wanted to lower that number. I'm not sure how well I did that year but my current screen time hovers around almost twice that now. OUCH

In our faith, fortunately, beginnings are not rooted in pressure or perfection, but in grace.

The Christian story is full of new starts: creation emerging from chaos, liberation breaking through oppression, resurrection rising from despair. Again and again, God meets people not with demands for self-improvement, but with invitations into deeper love, justice, and compassion. What if our approach to the new year reflected that same spirit?

Rather than resolutions that ask: "How can I fix myself?" We might consider intentions that ask: "How can I open myself?" Open to growth, to healing, to community, and to the movement of God already at work in and around us.

A faith-centered resolution might look less like a checklist and more like a posture. We might resolve to listen more deeply. More deeply to one another and to the quiet nudges of the Spirit. We might resolve to practice kindness. Kindness towards ourselves, and to those our culture casts aside. We might resolve to stay engaged with the world's pain without becoming hardened by it, trusting that hope is an act of courage.

For a community of faith resolutions can also be communal rather than individual. What would it mean for us, together, to resolve to be a more welcoming church? To deepen our commitment to justice, equity, and inclusion? To show up more faithfully for our neighbors near and far? These are not goals we accomplish once and check off; they are commitments we renew again and again.

The good news is that our worth is not dependent on how well we keep our resolutions. God's love does not fluctuate with our productivity or discipline. Even when our intentions falter, grace remains. Each day offers another chance to begin again. (And a new day to turn my phone off.)

As we step into this new year, may we release the pressure to become "better" versions of ourselves and instead embrace the call to become more loving, more honest, and more present. May our resolutions be gentle enough to sustain us and bold enough to transform us. And may we remember that every new beginning, whether marked on a calendar or in our hearts and souls, is held in the steadfast love of God.
